Jan's Healthy Recipes

Cherokee Rite of Passage

Michael's Potato Salad

Ingredients -

Potato Salad:

- 6 medium sized Red Russet Potatoes
- 1 medium sized onion
- ½ cup chopped olives
- 1/3 cup chopped dill pickles
- 3 boiled eggs
- 1/3 cup chopped celery

Dressing:

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 2 Tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 Tablespoons vinegar
- 1 Teaspoon salt
- ½ Teaspoon pepper
- 1 Teaspoon mustard
- A pinch of paprika
- 2 Tablespoons dill pickle juice

Directions:

Boil potatoes and let cool. Pealing is optional. Dice potatoes into cubes. Grate eggs. Mix ingredients with seasoning to suit. Add dressing. Let chill overnight.

Helpful Tips:

When boiling the potatoes, cook only until they can be speared with a fork without falling apart. My favorite mustard is Dijon but any kind will do.
