Ingredients:

- 6 medium sized Red Potatoes

- 3 boiled eggs
- 1/3 cup chopped celery

Dressing:

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 Tablespoons oil
- 1 Tablespoons vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon mustard
- A pinch of paprika
- 2 Tablespoons Dill Pickle juice

Directions: Boil potatoes and let cool. Pealing is optional.

Grate eggs.

Mix ingredients with seasoning to suit.

Add dressing.

Let chill over night.

Shark Bait

A marine biologist was involved in an experiment with a shark. He placed a shark in a tank along with other small bait fishes.

As expected, the shark ate every single fish.

The marine biologist then inserted a clear fiberglass to create two sections within the tank. He placed the shark in one section and smaller fished in the other section.

Remembering Virgil Starr

Virgil Starr, Auburn Church's Elder, Sabbath School Teacher, and long time member passed away from a heart attack om June 6, 2024.

Virgil was 71, born in Long Beach, California on May 19th, 1953 to Mark Sr. and Constance Starr.

Virgil grew up with his three siblings Daryl, Mark (deceased), and Sandra.

According to his brother Virgil was somewhat of a wild child, the author of such antics as rolling down a hill in a barrel and losing his clothes while fishing, these clothes were recovered by said brother and eventually reunited with Virgil.

Virgil came to a personal relationship with God in his 30's. Which lead him to become a Sabbath School teacher and elder in the church for the rest of his life. He studied and taught from the Bible and eventually felt led to highlight Revelation. He even was published in Our Firm Foundation with the cover story Revelation: A Letter to the Bride.

One of his students described Virgil's teaching this way – he brought a black and white bible to living color.

He became a business owner, father, Virgil friend, teacher and elder in the church. Virgil 4



for several years owned a glass business before becoming a plastering contractor.

Virgil was enamored with digital technology and routinely used a big screen video monitor in teaching his classes. He also built a state of the art video movie theater in his home. He loved to invite friends over to ex-

perience surround sound viewing. Unfortunately he had to convert his theater into living space so his family could join him in his home.

Virgil was the first to respond, be it to help clear a fallen tree, to visit or pray for a sick church member or host a bible study in his home.

Virgil is survived by four children Sheila, Cameron, Cassandra, Tierza and six grandchildren. He loved to travel and to go on mission visiting the Dominican Republic, Israel, India and Africa. He loved outdoor activities such as boating, back packing, skiing and RV camping with his friends.

The funeral service is to be scheduled for later this year in Oroville, California. Virgil will be laid to rest near his mother.
